

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


#### I TOOK A MAGIC LEAP INTO THE FUTURE

#### RAZE YOUR GAME AGAIN RAZER BLADE STEALTH 2019

If you're after a super–slim laptop that looks as good as it performs, you're probably tempted to plump for a MacBook Air, especially now it's got with the times and gained a Retina display (see p88). But what if you also want the ability to play some of your favourite games on the fly? As much as we love Apple's wafer-thin lappy, it's hardly known for its abilities as a gaming rig. And although the Razer Blade Stealth has traditionally been the Razer laptop that isn't primarily designed for games, its specced-up 2019 refresh is more than capable of hosting some lunchtime Fortnite. The Nvidia GeForce MX150 (25W 4GB GDDR5) graphics card in the mid-range model and above is a big step up on the Blade Stealth it's replacing, especially when the pixels are paired with an 8th-generation Whiskey Lake Intel Core i7 quad-core processor. There's a 4K version too. Throw in some high-end extras such as Dolby Atmos support, anti-ghosting tech on the RGB keyboard and a super-sleek aluminium chassis, and the new Stealth emerges as a mighty impressive machine.

Overwatch, Fortnite and Rocket League all play at a silky 60fps with the MX150 graphics card installed. If your gaming tastes are a bit more Crysis you can plug in an external graphics card via a Razer Core enclosure and you'll have a 4K gaming powerhouse. Or, if you're more of a creative type, go for the £1899 4K touchscreen version. Razer has also managed to pack four speakers and a smart amp into that tiny chassis; the Stealth supports Dolby Atmos, and it delivers impossibly rich 3D sound that's more immersive than a bucket of water over the head.

## **HEEL TALK** RS-COMPUTER SHOE

We've got smartphones, smartwatches and even smart toasters, but have you ever heard of a smart shoe? Fair to say they haven't exactly cracked the mainstream yet, but it turns out that Puma released a revolutionary pair of smart sneakers back in the '80s, when Mario was still kicking it in 8-bit. Dubbed the RS-Computer Shoe, the intelligent footwear was way ahead of its time when it first launched, and used a computer chip built into the chunky heel to let runners track calories, distance and time during their workout – as long as they could connect to an Apple IIE or Commodore 64. Now, for those of us who might not have a Commodore in the attic, Puma has updated its retro sneaks for the modern age, equipping them with a miniature 3-axis accelerometer, a USB-rechargeable lithium-polymer battery and a Bluetooth 4.0 radio transceiver that can be paired with Android or iOS. Puma wisely hasn't tinkered with the RS-Computer Shoe's glorious vintage finish, so there's nothing stopping you from sticking on a bit of Depeche Mode for your morning jog and pretending it's 1986 all over again. ## Arlo's latest Wi–Fi security camera keeps an Ultra HD eye on your gaff

#### Shadow play

Netflix and Sky Q might have decent-sized catalogues of 4K movies... but if you want to make your own Ultra HD version of Crimewatch, Winterwatch, You've Been Framed and Big Brother all rolled into one, you need one of Arlo's new wireless security cameras. Not only does the Ultra record in 4K, but it supports HDR as well — so even if someone tries to hide in the shadows there'll still be plenty of detail in the darker bits of the footage. Not that there

will be many shadows to hide in, because the Ultra has a bright, motion–activated spotlight, plus a siren to scare off any intruders.

#### • The devil's in the detail

Some might wonder what the point is of recording your garden goings-on in 4K, but capturing it all in as much detail as possible makes a lot of sense. If you do catch something untoward happening, being able to pick out details such as logos and car number plates could make all the difference further down the line, not to mention making it easier to recognise faces. The 180° view also means the Ultra can see as much of

your manor as possible, plus it automatically adjusts to follow movement when detected.

#### Wire we waiting

The Arlo Ultra is weatherproof, so you can mount it outside without worrying about the rain, plus it's battery-powered so you don't need to call an electrician to wire it in for you — saving both cash and tradsesman-related embarrassment/emasculation. Once it's up you can keep an eye on things via the Arlo app, but it'll also work with all kinds of third-party kit including your Apple Watch, Google Home Hub and Amazon Echo Show.

#### Scare tactics

If the Ultra detects something, you'll get an alert on your phone showing who or what is outside. Don't like what you see? Trigger the siren to scare them off.

#### • Who goes there?

The Arlo Ultra also has a speaker and two noise-cancelling mics, so you can speak to whoever set it off via your phone. What you choose to say will probably depend on what they're up to ...

#### Zonal marking

Sick of next door's cat triggering your camera? You can use the app to set specific zones for the camera to monitor or ignore, so Tiddles' night-time capers will no longer spark endless alerts.



#### Film my life HOVER 2

So you've reached that point where selfies just aren't enough. Now you want cinematic video selfies that look like they've been ejected from Hollywood's movie mincer. Enter the Hover 2. Tap a button and this drone whizzes into the air, cunningly avoiding obstacles with its spatial awareness, keeping track of you with auto-frame technology and performing amazing camera sweeps by way of Al algorithmic smarts. It'll output 4K video and 12MP photos, and in the controller-based Blast Off mode will stay aloft for up to 23 minutes, over a 5km range. That's more than enough for standing at the top of a hill, staring at the sky, because you've decided you're the new Brian Cox.

#### Top of the (mid)range NOKIA 8.1

They say you get what you pay for in life, but we can think of at least three crisp brands that aren't generous enough for their pricing. Nokia, meanwhile, would argue that you're getting more than what you're paying for with its new 8.1. The latest addition to the company's 'value flagship'line, this phone weighs in at a modest £380, but there's a 6.18in FHD+ edge-to-edge display with a hideable notch and HDR10 support. The dual-camera setup consists of a 12MP main snapper with a 13MP depth sensor beneath, while you get 20MP worth of selfie on the front. There's a Snapdragon 710 doing the heavy lifting and the phone runs on the fat-free Android One programme.

#### Elon Musk at it again?

Actually no, but we're pretty sure the billionaire flamethrower manufacturer and future Mars resident would love to see a Tesla logo on this two-wheeled marvel, and RoboCop would no doubt love to ride it. This is the Arc Vector (no relation to the Anki Vector, as far as we're aware). It is, according to its maker, the world's first fully electric cafe racer.

#### Sweet. Now give me numbers.

This futuristic motorcycle can do 0–60mph in the precise time it takes us to execute three star jumps (3.1 seconds) and has a top speed of just over 124mph. And with an urban range of 200 miles, or 120 if you've really got the throttle opened up, there's no need to constantly be worrying about where your next charge is coming from. The whole bike weighs in at just 220kg.

## It can go really fast for ages, got it. But something tells me you haven't even got to the best part yet.

Amazing how we're always on the same page. While the Vector itself is a magnificent creation, there's an argument to be made that the kit you get with it is even more impressive. The connected Arc Zenith helmet has a head-up display (HUD) that can show you the speedometer, sat-nav prompts and whatever its rear camera wants to alert you about. You can access its different modes with a controller or just by using your voice. Then there's the haptic Origin armour, which can use gentle vibrations to warn you about potential blind-spot hazards. It's sci-fi made real.

#### Should come in nice and cheap...

The package starts at £90,000, but Arc will install a 45-minute charger at your home as part of the deal.





## Together we can(s) ASTELL&KERN T5P (2018)

Whether it's all that time they spend hanging around strong magnets, some sort of static charge generated by the constant chin–stroking, or something else that only they can hear, audiophiles gravitate towards each other. That must be how headphone experts Beyerdynamic teamed up with hi–res audio kings Astell&Kern for these new cans, tuned for the latter's portable music players. The second–gen AK T5p headphones also have a specially made eight–conductor braided cable – no Bluetooth here. Only 1000 pairs are being made, with a hefty asking price of \$1199, but you can guarantee that wearing a pair will be like a siren call to other frowning finger–tappers.




## COSTA CLEVER CUP

rural community. While Joseph Seed's fanatical followers are no longer a threat, World War III's harsh aftermath brings its own challenges and obstacles. For starters, weapons are scarce in New Dawn's post-apocalyptic world, forcing players to scavenge for

resources and craft their own gear. On the plus side, this means a focus on fun homemade weapons such as the saw blade launcher.

When not slinging circular can command brand new Guns and Fangs for hire, from a sniping senior citizen named Nana to an over-sized boar capable of knocking multiple baddies on their backsides simultaneously. Players will need all the help they can get, though, because New Dawn also welcomes a fresh faction of foes. Dubbed the

Highwaymen, this group is led by twin sisters Mickey and Lou, a take-no-prisoners pair who are determined to dominate.

Anyone looking to survive against this deadly duo will want eek out the best resc for weapon-crafting. Thankfully, New Dawn also introduces Expeditions, missions to far-off places where you fight in biomes and score loot.

The cult might be history, but based on our peek at New Dawn, it seems Hope County still has plenty of post-apocalypse surprises in store.


It's been quite the journey for Hello Games. The Guildford developer's last project was *No Man's Sky*, the procedurally generated space exploration game with 18 quintillion planets to explore.

Problem was, when the game launched, players quickly realised that occasionally alien-inhabited planets aren't much fun if there's nothing to do on them, and a backlash ensued... which rolled on for weeks.

Hello has since added a ton of new content to *No Man's Sky*, enough to bring a lot of the community back in; but the studio has decided to rein in the scale a bit for its new title, *The Last Campfire*.

It's a colourful adventure game about a lost ember trying to work out how to get home (presumably to a fire). Judging by the trailer, we can expect to explore mysterious ruins on land and water.

They're calling this the first 'Hello Games Short'. The idea is to let employees unleash their creativity between the development of bigger titles. If they all look as lovely as this one, we say unleash away.

#### Woah, has Jeep been feeding its cars performance-enhancing drugs instead of petrol?

The monstrous hunk of metal before you certainly seems to have been sipping something special. The Gladiator, Jeep's first pickup truck in nearly 25 years, is so chest-thumpingly masculine it could probably grow a beard if it wanted to.

#### Let's off-road!

With pleasure. It might dwarf the average family hatchback, but the Gladiator should be able to go pretty much anywhere, and it'll hold more than 700kg of your gear in the truck bed while it does it. The doors can be unbolted and swapped for rally-raid swaybars, the windscreen can be flipped down, and you can detach the roof for open-to-the-elements exploring. It's a true off-roader, just like every other Jeep, with abody-on-frame chassis,

front and rear axle locks, a limited slip differential and low-range four-wheel-drive gearbox.

#### Must have a pretty epic motor to manage that, surely?

Naturally. The Gladiator has the same 3.6-litre V6 as the Wrangler hiding under its bonnet, with 285bhp and 260lb-ft of torque on tap. Now that doesn't translate to crazy-quick speeds on the road, but means steady progress on just about any surface. Plus, all that pulling power means it'll happily tow four metric tonnes.

#### So when can I take one for a test drive?

Apple's torn up the iPad design template for its new Pro flagship, complete with faster chip and magnetic Pencil dock. Enough to make it the GOAT?

pple reckons its new iPad Pro is the device's biggest shake-up since the original - and it has a point. There's no home button. It's

got a swanky 'all screen' design, and has the kind of powerful innards that have notebooks glancing nervously at each other. It remains a slab of glass


and metal, but still feels a bit radical. The bezel is even on both sides, and the display's curves mirror those of the device's frame – an arguably bigger feat here than with the iPhone XR's LCD. It makes the outgoing 10.5in model look comparatively archaic.

The A12X Bionic chip at the heart of the Pro is reportedly

faster than the CPUs in 92% of portable PCs sold during the past 12 months, and significantly outperforms last year's iPad Pro (which was no slouch).

Both the 11in and 12.9in models' displays have 264ppi resolution, which is less sharp than your average phone but fine at tablet-viewing distances. The optional Folio keyboard/case and Pencil have also been revamped and, inevitably, the headphone port has gone; but the Lightning connectivity has also been ditched, in favour of USB-C.

Well, all new Apple products have to be controversial in one way or another. The question is whether it's worth punching your wallet in the face to buy this one...



#### 1 His latest frame

Calling the new iPad 'all screen' is a bit of a stretch, given that there's still that bezel all the way around. But the black frame isn't a problem, and actually helps you focus on content — plus Apple has stuffed the new, improved Face ID camera into it.

#### 2 Baby I don't glare


Yes, it's a fingerprint magnet, but the display coating makes this screen more usable in bright rooms than the plain old iPad. Apple's ProMotion and True Tone technologies ensure the display is super-responsive and adapts to your viewing environment.

For the most part, iOS 12 is very impressive. We've heard people bellyaching about this tablet lacking pro apps, but that depends on your definition of 'pro'. It's a fine tool for creative productivity... but no, we wouldn't want to manage spreadsheets on the thing.

### Alexa's bold as love

Legendary guitar amp maker Marshall has mixed iconic style with modern gubbins to create a rocking wireless speaker, complete with badly behaved Alexa

You're spoiled for choice if you've got £350 or so to spend on a smart speaker - all shapes, sizes, colours and performance levels are available to you.

So then, what if your new smart speaker has to speak to your inner guitar hero? What if you want it to invoke images of Pete Townshend writing off another night's profits as he trashes his equipment? Of Lemmy standing impassively in front of a wall of roaring amps? Of Jimi laying his guitar on the stage and fishing in his pockets for a lighter?

Well, what you want is the new Marshall Stanmore II Voice. It's got the wireless convenience you crave, and an Alexa interface that makes it as intelligent as the smartest speakers around. Plus it looks so much like a little Marshall guitar amp you'll be tempted to rush to the edge of your (imaginary) stage and throw the Devil's horns hand-shapes at your imaginary audience. Just don't go crowd surfing. The coffee table's not up to it.

**1 Are you Alexperienced?** The Stanmore II Voice looks exactly like you'd expect a Marshall speaker to look: big, wrapped in textured vinyl, with rotary controls on the top panel and salt-and-pepper acoustic cloth across the front. Plus, of course, that iconic logo.

#### 2 Voodoo dial

Everything is put together smoothly and sturdily. As well as nicely weighted volume, bass and treble dials with LED indicators, the control plate also includes a 3.5mm aux input, a source selector button plus play/pause and mic mute.

Around the back are a pair of RCA analogue inputs and a bass reflex port. Wireless connectivity extends as far as Bluetooth, Wi-Fi and Spotify Connect. Future options include the ability to form an Alexa-controlled multiroom system.



- Amazon has put 4K in a streaming device before but that was a box, not a stick. Now it's crammed 4K, Dolby Vision and HDR10+ support into this little twiglet – which has a faster processor and comes with the new Alexa Voice Remote.
- The remote's sleek form factor makes getting the battery cover off an exasperating swear-fest, but that aside, setup is just about idiot-proof. Plug the stick into an HDMI port and hook up the USB power cable to the mains. Instructions on the TV then guide you through the rest.
- Amazon says its new 1.7GHz processor makes this unit 80% more powerful than the standard Fire TV Stick. You can zip around the on-screen interface at speed, and it's very quick to respond.
- The Alexa Voice Remote combines Bluetooth and IR tech with far-field voice recognition, so you can control your TV with Alexa's help. It works well with Prime Video, at least for basic commands, but support for other apps is limited. You can also use it to control your other smart home gadgets, though.
- The good news is that 4K content looks sharp. The bad news is that the selection of 4K HDR stuff still feels quite sparse: most of it is Prime and Netflix original content, which isn't all great television. But this stick does a decent job of displaying lower-res picture feeds.



- Vou're a genius, aren't you?
  Course you are. If only you had some way of getting down your brilliant, multi-layered ideas in hi-fi quality before you forget them. If only you had a mini mobile studio, complete with built-in condenser microphone, one-button recording and instant overdubbing...
- There are already plenty of pocket audio interfaces and apps for mobile multitracking, but the lzotope Spire has a few secret weapons: that 'studio-grade' microphone, a clever soundcheck function for setting input levels, a pair of mic/instrument inputs for recording two tracks at once, and the ability to work with or without a smartphone.
- Yep, the Spire will record as a standalone device. You could come up with a six-part barbershop masterpiece while abseiling down El Capitan and have it all recorded by the time you reach the bottom and get eaten by a bear.
- You'll want to hook it up with a tablet or phone for mixing and song management, though. Wi–Fi pairing and syncing are quick, and the app is simple enough for novices.
- The audio quality from that mic (and the Grace Design preamps) is excellent. And once you're done, it's an easy job to export the tracks to your regular DAW as wav files for pro-standard mixing. Well, easy as long as you're an Apple fan: you can't export individual tracks via Android. That's almost as annoying as being eaten by a bear.


#### **THE BASICS**

#### ■ Twizzle your tabs

The Snapseed interface is split between three tabs: Looks, Tools and Export. You'll also see several buttons at the top of the screen. Open is used to open a new image. To the right, there's a square with an arrow over it, for accessing undo/ redo/revert and your edit history. Next to that are the image details button and the menu for tutorials.

#### ■ Try some tools

Snapseed's interface is context-sensitive, and changes with the selected tool. However, there are commonalities, such as being able to cancel or confirm edits. Tools with presets have them appear above the bottom toolbar. Those where you can fine-tune parameters have a



slider button. Tap it or just drag up/down on the image to choose a parameter, and then drag left/right to assign it a new value.

#### Start croppin'

With the crop tool, the grid helps you compose your snap using the rule of thirds. Tap the ratios button (rectangle) for presets if you don't want to go freeform. Elsewhere, the

rotate tool initially attempts to automatically straighten your photos. If you don't like the results, drag to adjust.

#### ■ Get up close

By default, Snapseed will display your entire image within the confines of your device's screen, even if it's massive. Pinch to zoom in. Snapseed's navigator will then show which bit of your image you're looking at by marking it in blue; you can drag this section around to more easily navigate your image.

#### Add text and frames

Snapseed is primarily an app for retouching and adding filters, so you don't get freeform drawing brushes. However, there are text and frames tools. You can use the text tool multiple times to add separate and individually styled pieces of text.




If you want a quick colour and lighting fix for an image, use Tune Image and tap the wand. For a more manual solution, tap the sliders button to see the seven parameters you can individually adjust; fiddle until your pic is how you want it.

#### Adjust curves

The curves tool used to be the preserve of Photoshop, but Snapseed has one – and a bunch of presets behind the card button. Select one and edit it by tapping the curve to add an edit point and then dragging it. Use the button next to 'x' to limit changes.

Looks are Snapseed at its most accessible. Tap one to change your photo's appearance. Easy! Now select 'View edits' from the undo/ edits menu. You'll see the tools/edits used to construct the Look. Tap one for a flyout menu; here you can trash, mask or adjust the edit.

#### Save a Look

If you edit a Look and like what you've ended up with, head to the Looks tab, scroll to the end of the list and tap '+'. Name your Look and it's now stored in Snapseed, ready to apply to other images.



#### **ALL IN THE EDIT**

#### ■ Tweak without fear

Edits you make in Snapseed are non-destructive. This means they aren't burned into the image when you confirm them, and can be removed or adjusted at any time. The only time they're effectively fixed for good is during export.

#### Add a mask

Tap the mask (pencil) button from an edit menu. That 'layer' will be masked out. Draw across it and areas marked in red will become visible again. To erase part of your mask, tap the down arrow to set the tool value to zero and paint over red bits.

#### Disable layers

On tapping an edit, you temporarily disable everything above it. Tap 'Original' and the topmost edit to switch between vour original image and what you've done to it.

Tap 'Export' (or the share button in iOS on landscape) to send your saved image elsewhere. Only on Android can you export to specific folders; but on iOS you can save an image with changes that you can later undo.



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

Winter's here and it's far too cold and wet to go out on the bike. Time to start racking up the virtual miles so you're not at the back of the pack when spring comes.

Right out of the box, you'll notice the Wahoo Kickr is considerably heavier than your fancy carbon bike, but that just makes it stable and confidence-inspiring while you're trying to push 400 Watts for that bit of interval training.

It can be used with all types of bikes too, with

height adjustments for those with wheels from 24 to 29in and hub options for traditional QR skewers or more modern Thru Axles. As your bike is mounted directly to the trainer, it's almost silent while you're pedalling great if you're watching TV or listening to podcasts while working out.

KICKR

Setting up is as easy as riding a bike: download the Wahoo fitness app and it connects to the Kickr via Bluetooth; a quick calibration and you're ready to ride. The

app also acts as a workout hub, showing your speed, distance, time and cadence, shouting out information for the last km. It also supports heart-rate monitoring, as long as you've sprung for extra sensors.

Training inside on your own can be sorta dull, but pairing with Zwift (or similar software) it really starts to shine, varying the resistance to simulate going up or down hills – and racing randoms around Watopia is huge amounts of fun.


First things first: it doesn't come with a cassette for the rear wheel, so you'll have to buy one separately or take the one you've already got off your wheel and switch it over. If you happen to be running Campagnolo, you'll also need an extra adapter: £45. Ouch.

In use, the Neo 2 is similar to the Kickr, with the same sensors and compatibility with the same training apps. But the big difference is its ability to simulate road response, which can make it feel like you're riding on the cobbles of Roubaix.

You can also use it while it's not plugged in — handy if you're planning on taking it racing for the warm-up or warm-down.







Weighing just 27g, the two devices attach to the back of your swim cap and goggle straps (just

in front of your right or left ear) without being too cumbersome. By sitting on your head, instead of around your wrist like most other watery activity trackers, the GPS module faces the sky during swimming. This ensures much better accuracy over algorithms from smartwatches, which attempt to pin your location via data from your wrist between strokes.

The Marlin gives you instant feedback via bone conduction on strokes, pace,



It might have beaten Nintendo to the CD-ROM era of gaming in the '90s, but Sony is playing catchup in the current retro console wars. It's all enough to drown you in loving nostalgia; and much of the PlayStation Classic experience is artfully crafted. But the holes start to appear once you dig into the 20-game line-up and find a number of major omissions... and then realise that many early 3D games just don't hold up all that well today.



- You know the saying: if it ain't broke, keep your filthy hands off it. But if you can make it smaller and cheaper without breaking it in the process, go right ahead. So KEF has taken everything it's learned from the runaway success of its LS50 Wireless speakers and made something... well, the same, but less so.
- The LSX's design is on a much more compact scale than its £2000 sibling. Each speaker is just 24cm high, making this an authentic desktop proposition.
- There's a host of colour options, and all but the gloss-white finish are wrapped in hard-wearing Kvadrat fabric. Overall build quality is impeccable – just as well, because their sheer portability means they may well end up being carried about like cups of tea.
- It's quite obvious these things are closely related to the LS50 Wireless: they have the same detail and poise; treble is crisp without getting hard unless you really wind up the volume; the midrange is sweetly expressive; and for such little boxes they even manage respectable bass. There's a subwoofer pre-out, but for most musical needs you won't need it.
- The only areas where the LSXs don't truly smash it are pretty predictable, given their size: outright scale and dynamic reach. In most home situations they're plenty hefty enough, though.

# Airy monster

Apple has revamped its entry-level MacBook with a Retina display, a new keyboard and a choice of three classy colours... **Natalya Paul** enjoys a fortnight of fresh Air

#### DAY 01

Fans have been waiting years for Apple to show some love to its most affordable laptop, and now, a whole decade after the Air was first revealed, the new generation has arrived.

Design, hardware and software have received significant updates that bring the company's most popular MacBook bang up to date. It also rocks a 100% recycled aluminium alloy shell – but the price has skyrocketed. Factor in

the increasingly blurred lines between MacBook, MacBook Air and MacBook Pro models, and buying a new Apple laptop has quickly turned into something of a minefield. So let's find out if the Air is still the MacBook for the masses.

This new model borrows just about every design cue it can from Apple's premium laptops, and comes in a choice of space grey, gold or silver. And the 13in Air is undeniably sleek. It's slimmer than a ballpoint pen at the rear and only 4mm at the front — there's no backpack that won't have room for one of these inside it, and it barely wakes up the scales at 1.25kg.

Lift the lid and you'll find a MacBook Pro-matching keyboard that's bookended by stereo speakers, plus a giant glass touchpad and skinny black screen bezels.

The Air stands out from the base 13in Pro thanks to a Touch ID button in the top right corner of the keyboard, which lets you log in to macOS Mojave with a

digit. It works just as quickly here as it did on any iPhone before Face ID took over.

This is the first MacBook Air to charge over USB-C, which means the old MagSafe connector has gone. You get two USB-C ports, and either can recharge the laptop, but they're rather close together: plug in a chunky peripheral and you might obscure the other port.

Photographers won't like the lack of a built-in SD card reader, which means they'll need to use a dongle, but at least you get a headphone jack on the right side, if that's any consolation.

#### **DAY 02**

The old Air's 1440x900 screen resolution was decidedly old hat in 2018. At 2560x1600, this Retina display treads a sensible middle ground between 1080p and 4K. The chunky bezels are gone too, and side by side with the old Air there's a big step up in detail.

#### DAY 04

The keyboard uses the same butterfly design as the 12in MacBook and MacBook Pro, which is much slimmer and with far less key travel than before. Yes, there've been issues, but a new silicone barrier should keep dirt from getting under the keys here.

#### **ODAY 06**

The new Air has a dual-core i5 CPU ticking along at 1.6GHz. That's slower than the 1.8GHz chip in the old Air, but these processors are more efficient at lower speeds. So performance is on a par, but battery drain is lower.

There's more than enough power here to run a handful of apps at once. I've been working on some sizeable Photoshop files today and it's always felt responsive. Even *Fortnite* is playable, as long as you're





prepared to drop the details, accept frame rates in the 30s and put up with some fan noise.

#### DAY 09

The last-gen Air could comfortably outlast the Pro model away from the mains, and this new version can do the same. Today I've thrown in some more picture editing, a bit of gaming and some Netflix, and the Air still topped 11 hours.

#### DAY 12

Time to explore some of the extra macOS Mojave goodies. These include an eye-friendly Dark theme, a tweaked App Store that makes finding new apps that much easier, desktop stacks for organising messy files and folders, and the improved gallery view for Finder. You also get Siri, and it's not the airhead it used to be.


### DAY 14

This Air makes the 12in MacBook feel slightly redundant and looks every bit as premium as the Pro. It's not cheap, though: the Air is now almost the same price as the entry-level Pro, which has much more power. Still, for anyone who doesn't need that extra grunt, it's got to be the go-to MacBook.

# Super Smash Bros. Ultimate

Good news if you're up for a rumble: *Smash* makes a triumphant comeback on the Switch, and every character's invited in the biggest roster of fighters you've ever seen

rom its beginnings on the N64 up to Super Smash Bros on the Wii U, Smash has become one of Nintendo's hallmark series.

But it's also one giant love letter to all the franchises Nintendo has put out over the years — and this feeling comes across tenfold in the aptly named *Ultimate*.

With its gargantuan roster of characters, which includes every *Smash* fighter from all the past iterations as well as 11 new ones, you have 74 playable fighters to

try out in this Switch title. Yep, that's a lot of smashing.

The biggest new addition is the new adventure mode, Spirit. Set in a giant hub world, what's truly great about this mode is the role of the Spirits themselves. Some improve your fighting stats, others have special skills that attach to the primary ones. This adds a new level of strategy to the fighting, as different spirit combinations can help you in different duels.

But Classic mode is back too. Each character has a unique run of opponents and maps, tailored to fit their own franchise or fighting style. You'll find five or six stages to get through, including one bonus map stage that's a side-scrolling platformer. Here you have to outrun a black hole and collect as many coins as possible along the way.

Smash mode is of course a mainstay, and several other familiar modes also make a comeback. There's plenty here to keep you entertained, and it's a feast for veterans of the series who enjoyed these challenges in previous games.

It's no exaggeration to say Super Smash Bros. Ultimate is hands—down the best Smash game yet. There's so much going on, with something for everyone to dip into, while the huge array of fighters certainly makes it feel like you're getting your money's worth and then some.

This is a fantastic way to get into the world of *Smash*, and long-time fans will not be disappointed.

# Character building

With such a massive roster of combatants, it'll take some time to unlock every character in this game. In the same way as previous *Smash* titles in the series worked, you get challenged by a new fighter every once in a while. If you win, you then unlock that character.

Whoever you were fighting as prior to that challenge will be the fighter you have to try to defeat them with, which can sometimes hinder you if you're not fully accustomed to that character.

In the past, if you lost one of these challenges you'd just have to hope your conqueror would pop up again at random. But *Ultimate* has a rather nice new feature called the Challenger's Approach, accessed via a door that pops up once in a while in the corner of the Games & More selection menu. This lets you challenge fighters you lost to previously, so you can have another stab at unlocking them – with the crucial perk of being able to choose which fighter you want to face them with.

It's a great little addition that means you don't have to feel quite so disheartened when you lose against a fighter you're desperate to take on.



he latest entry in
Bethesda's open-world
RPG still sports a bit of

While the West Virginian scenery might put you in the mood to pick apples, that perky sentiment will be severely crushed the first time you come across a group of folks who apparently woke up on the wrong side of the apocalypse. A backstory-centric narrative approach, combined with the fact that your character is part of a group of recently emerged vault-dwellers tasked with reclaiming the post-war world, really sells the story.

Sadly though, this approach also inherently means the game's massive map is devoid of human life — aside from other online players — to interact with. There's certainly no shortage of quests to tackle, but they're typically tied to deceased humans or robots, and are generally found in terminals, notes, holotapes, letters and other objects you can't have a conversation with.

Many of these quests are also of the 'fetch' variety. There are some absorbing missions to take on and, more so, engaging stories to uncover about the world that once was; but much of it feels like the sort of lore-expanding side content that would support a meatier main plot.

Of course, the always-online multiplayer format encourages players to author their own adventures with other real-life survivors. And to its credit, the game is at its best when you've met up with a mate to scavenge: it feels genuinely rewarding to help a fellow survivor in need.

We have no doubt Bethesda will improve the experience through upcoming patches. But whether it can convert single-player fans to an always-online wasteland remains to be seen.





Thankfully, as Rico Rodriguez, you have a grappling hook, a parachute and a wingsuit to keep you out of harm's way as you pull off ludicrous stunts and manoeuvres in this crazy open-world sandbox.

The movement in Just Cause 4 is exceptional. Chaining a grapple into the wingsuit to gain speed and altitude is exhilarating, while scaling mountains and skydiving through chasms or skimming rooftops as you pass villages and towns is simply brilliant.

As with previous games, the grappling hook is the star. But new to this title is the ability to mod your tools and add a Metal Gear Fulton-style balloon to lift people and things into the air. Not enough? Fine, you can also add a jet-boost to the balloon.

Still not enough? How about tweaking those tools to withstand enemy damage, or make a balloon full of helium, or even change the rate at which your jets accelerate? This is a ridiculous game that revels in the insanity you can create with its toolset.

The weather effects are stunning, the weaponry is creative, and the helicopters remain a highlight... but all that isn't quite enough for us to recommend you rush out and buy Just Cause 4. Because the story missions are iust terrible.

It's bizarre that a game with such chaotic content plays it so safe with the missions and structure. As you're leading a rebellion, you progress the story by doing a mission in a controlled zone, upgrading your army and pushing forward. But goodness, those missions are sorely lacking in ideas and variation.

And while this is a huge open world, it's a little empty of curated content. What remains is a feeling that you should 'make your own fun' – and that's great while it lasts, but you're left wanting that creativity in the rest of the game. **Adam Cook**





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

Tsk, not those kind of red lights. We're talking traffic lights. Did you know the first set was installed outside the Houses of Parliament 150 years ago? Just think how much time people have spent waiting at red lights ever since. Even back then there were probably people in stagecoaches just wishing someone would invent something they could beep in frustration. But if Jaguar's latest innovation takes off, horn–blasting traffic jams could become a thing of the past.

#### Like stagecoaches?

Exactly like stagecoaches. Everyone knows how good it feels when every set of lights you encounter seems to magically turn green as you approach. Well, what if that wasn't magic at all? Jaguar has developed something called a Green Light Optimal Speed Advisory (GLOSA) system that communicates with traffic lights on a car's route and tells the driver the optimum speed they should travel at in order to avoid waiting at a red light when they arrive at each junction. It's currently being tested out in one of the company's excellent F-Pace SUVs.

# But not every light can be green all the time. It'd be chaos!

You're missing the point. When drivers speed up to beat the lights, or brake suddenly when they realise they're not going to make it, this creates more pollution and potentially causes accidents (as well as the aforementioned frustration). This isn't going to make red lights obsolete, but waiting times will be reduced. Add in Intersection Collision Warning (ICW), which helps to prevent crashes and advises who should go next at junction stand-offs, and commuting could be about to get just a bit less painful.
